

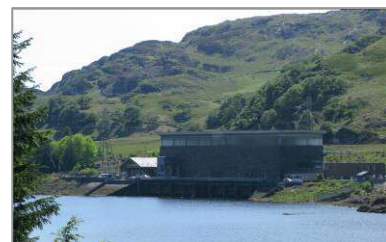
Environmental Policy

- engage with professional and public bodies, clients, other consultants, suppliers and end users to ensure a development in awareness of environmental issues and the implementation of best practice
- maintain a commitment at all times to the prevention of pollution
- ensure professional staff are familiar with the environmental policies of client organisations and encourage environmental awareness amongst those clients who do not have such policies in place or who may be unaware of current best practice
- design sustainable buildings which, through the appropriate use of materials, construction techniques and technology, achieve a reduction in use of energy, water and other resources both during construction and throughout the building's life and demonstrate an awareness of the building's impact on its environment and contribution to the development of sustainable communities
- take into account the environmental benefits from use of timber and other products from sustainable sources, use of locally sourced materials (as available and appropriate) and materials capable of recycling, avoiding the use of hazardous or contaminating materials
- appoint suppliers and contractors who demonstrate a similar awareness of environmental issues
- ensure a process of monitoring, review and continual improvement of its environmental performance
